Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes

As activities are completed, students are assessed through common rubrics. Collective data are used to track individual student's achievement. An individual student's data are checked prior to graduation to be sure each student has achieved mastery in each required area of study. The data are also analyzed and used in programmatic continuous improvement to affect policy, initiate broad curricular changes as needed, and to modify individual course activities and assessments.
