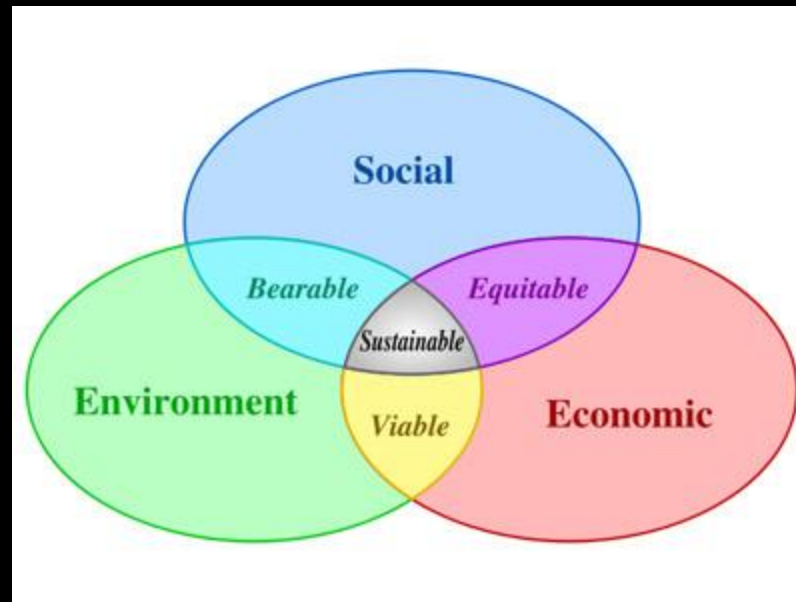

- HEASC has endorsed the Presidents' Climate Commitment



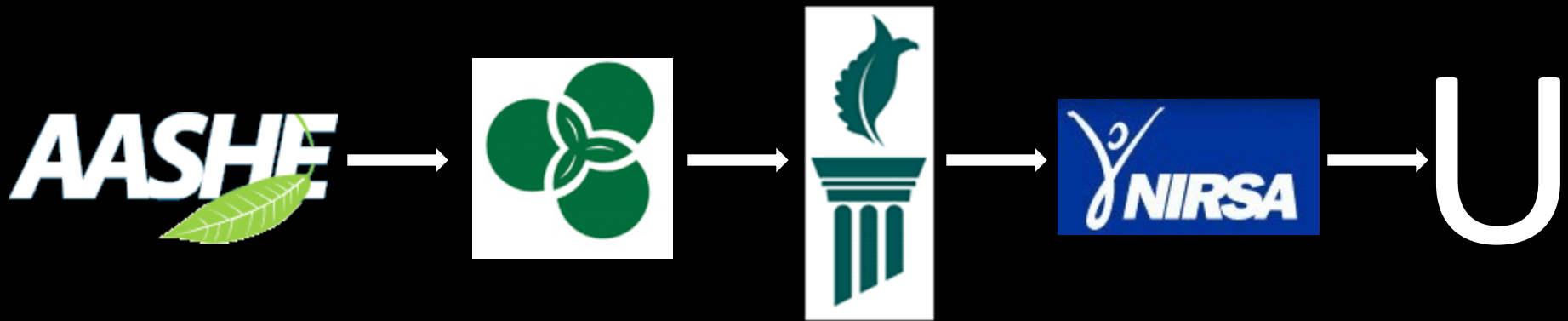
presidents' climate commitment

Presidents signing the Commitment are pledging to eliminate their campuses' greenhouse gas emissions over time.

- Emissions inventory.
- Goals for climate neutrality.
- Immediate reduction in greenhouse gas emissions.
- Sustainability in the curriculum.
- Publicize plans and results.

yellow is the new green

- The Yellow Bike Program
- Collaboration between Outdoor Adventures and Sports Clubs, specifically the UWF Cycling Club.



- Community bike program similar to others around the country
- Donated/found bikes
- Fixed and painted yellow
- Placed on campus for anyone to use

Promoting the use of bikes one campus instead of cars.

yellow is the new green

- Yellow Pumps
- Most recent addition to campaign



- Chained to bike racks
- For Yellow Bikes and any other
- Continuing to promote bike use instead of cars

Promoting self-reliant commuters.

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- Yellow Mug Program



- Paper-less Barbeque
- Bike Tune-ups
- Can be used at the UWF dining services instead of disposable cups

Promoting reuse as a waste-reduction strategy.

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- March it Out
- Collaboration between all program areas in Recreation and Sports Services



- Gave out yellow lanyards saying “Yellow is the New Green”
- Set up tables at the Commons and the Recreation Facility with reasons to walk/bike on campus instead of driving
